Facility Assessment Survey on the Horizon

House Bill 2792, passed by the Legislature on April 6 and subsequently signed by the Governor, requires the Library Commission to conduct a survey to determine the construction and maintenance needs of public libraries. It further requires the Library Commission to develop a status report and 10-year plan for library construction and maintenance. The results of the survey will provide local libraries, the Library Commission, the Legislature, and the Governor much needed information on capabilities and needs. I have been at the Commission a long time and do not recall another survey of

██████████ this scope.

Phase 1, the online survey, will be launched next month. The logic behind the survey is to collect needed information with minimal stress. We all have been victims of survey fatigue. Unlike Bibliostat, most of the questions have multiple choice answers. If you don't know when the library's roof was last upgraded, "Unknown" is a choice. Most questions also have a comment box so you can provide additional details.

One focus of HB 2792 is meeting space available for public use. This is encouraging. It indicates an awareness of an important, often overlooked role of libraries. In [Library as Place: Rethinking Roles, Rethinking Space](#), architect Geoffrey T. Freeman writes, "*The library is the only centralized location where new and emerging information technologies can be combined with traditional knowledge resources in a user-focused, service-rich environment that supports today's social and educational patterns of learning, teaching, and research.*"

Please complete the survey to the best of your ability. Some Directors who have reviewed the draft see the survey as an aid to their own facility assessments.

I hope to have preliminary results to share at the WVLA annual conference. Speaking of which, I hope you have November 8-10 marked on your calendar.

Commission News

Dalzell Steps Down

At its April 2017 meeting, the West Virginia Library Commission said good-bye to one of its long-time members. Commissioner David Dalzell is stepping down after 8 years on the WVLC.



Commissioner Dalzell has spent much of his adult life in service to West Virginia public libraries. He has been a member of the Moundsville-Marshall County Public Library Board of Trustees for nearly four decades, and he is a former chair of the Trustee section of the WV Library Association. He joined the WV Library Commission in 2009.

In 2014, Commissioner Dalzell was awarded the the WV Library Association's certificate of merit for service to libraries and librarianship in West Virginia. And in April, WVLC members presented the commissioner with a resolution of appreciation for his lifelong commitment to the development of library services in the state.

WVLC Partners with the WV Human Rights Commission

The West Virginia Human Rights Commission is teaming up with the WVLC to improve public awareness for fair housing rules and regulations and the rights of citizens to choose where they want to live without fear of discrimination. To spread the word, the HRC is shipping packets containing brochures and CDs to every library in the state.

These free informational packets provide information on fair housing rights and are intended to be handed out to library patrons. The CDs are specifically designed for the visually impaired.



This joint venture was announced by Library Commission Executive Secretary Karen Goff and Acting HRC Executive Director Marykaye Jacquet, and is being funded by a federal Housing and Urban Development Partnership grant received by the HRC.

Organizations Welcome Librarians After Town Tackles Parks, Jobs and Safety

The Spokane County (Wash.) Library District is known for its customer service, material lending and management of public dollars. So when a new library director suggested a community-oriented initiative to staff members, some rolled their eyes. But after some initial skepticism, the changes have been overwhelmingly positive: Librarians see community engagement work as part of their fundamental responsibilities, and the library has



been invited to participate in the community in new and exciting ways.



To kick off this city-wide change Library Director Nancy Ledebor asked branch librarians to engage their residents in conversations.

From the discussions, the librarians learned many people felt disconnected from the community. With new knowledge about what their residents wanted, the library set out to create programs to bring people together. Librarians in the Valley Branch started visiting an alternative high school every week to help students with résumé-building and interviewing skills. The Deer Park Branch partnered with an Eagle Scout to haul 300 bags of trash and wood out of a local park, which was renamed “Library Park.”

“We could have just asked for money and hired a landscaper, but doing it the way we did created leadership opportunities for people to step forward,” said Ledebor. “It connected a whole bunch of other people and gave them opportunities to socialize.”

When searching for online training sessions, I often find high price tags for in-depth classes. That’s not the case with [edX.org](#).

Morgantown Public Library Director Sarah Palfrey suggested that I check out a class on the site entitled *Library Advocacy Unshushed*. Like other courses on the site, it is designed in the style of a college class. It gave me a fresh perspective on an old idea, and I would highly recommend it.

Most of the courses on [edX.org](#) are free. However, a few technical courses and some class certifications require a fee.



Major players in library continuing education create and publish on the site, including Massachusetts Institute of Technology, Harvard University, Berkeley UC, and others. Titles range from *Leading with Effective Communication (Inclusive Leadership Training)* and *Finance for Everyone: Smart Tools for Decision Making* to *The Rise of Superheroes and their impact on Pop Culture and Sharks! Global Biodiversity, Biology, and Conservation*. Each course I have viewed has videos and extra resources listed. It’s worth checking out!


Additional questions relating to travel expenses are included in the application and will be used to revise the scholarship amounts.

In the Language of Miracles




