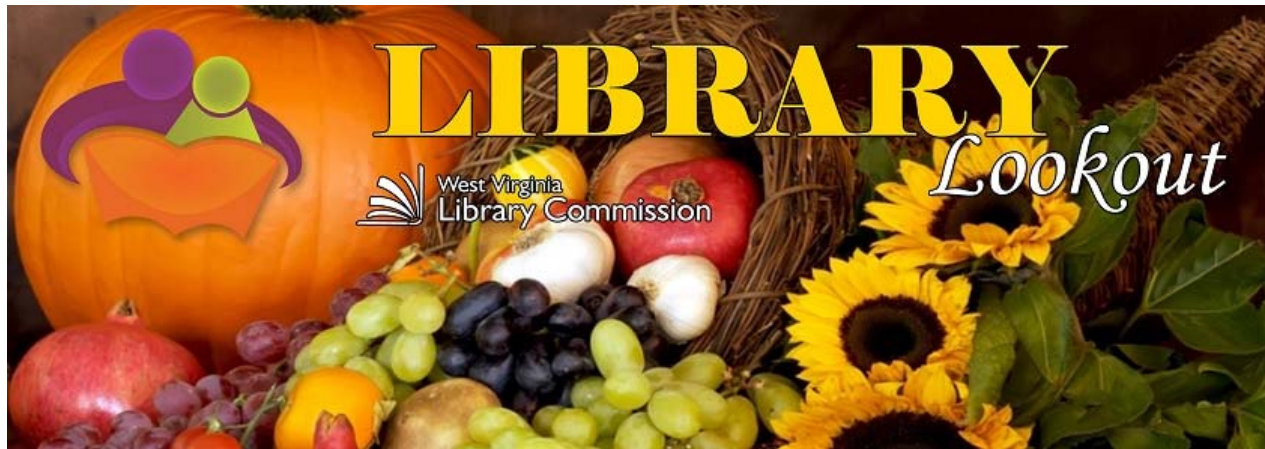

West Virginia's Public Libraries: Essential to a Successful State



West Virginia is home to more public libraries than Walmart stores and McDonalds combined. These libraries vary in size from 724 square feet to more than 66,000 square feet and in annual operating budgets from \$27,000 to \$8.1 million. They all have books, provide access points to cyberspace and preserve local history. Libraries develop and enhance multiple literacies, serve as community centers and connect people to jobs, educational opportunities, health resources, government services and each other. Trustees and Friends Groups

Libraries across the country celebrated National Friends of Libraries Week last month. Just as personal friends enhance our social lives; Friends of Libraries make a difference for the libraries they serve. Sally Gardner Reed, who retired as Executive Director of United for Libraries Association of Trustees, Advocates, Friends and Foundations this summer, states, *"Friends extend a library's capacity through dollar gifts, volunteer and program support, and through advocacy."*

The most effective Friends groups are well organized and work in conjunction with the library Board and library Director. The Trustee/Friends group relationship, just like the Trustee/Library Director relationship is a partnership with common goals and specific responsibilities. Those common goals might include: fundraising, library promotion and marketing, advocacy, immediate need such as a building project, and/or creation of a strong library volunteer force. However, the role of a Friend's group and the legal function of a library Board are not the same. The Board is legally responsible for overseeing the general operation of the library, establishing policy, planning; budgeting, and conducting public relations. Friends value the services of the library and are independently organized to support those services.

Even though the Board and the Friends are focused on the same general goal, the path to accomplishing that goal will be much smoother with a formal operating agreement between the Library and the Friends. This takes some time, energy, and expertise. It may seem unnecessary to well established groups but, in the *Libraries Need Friends* toolkit, Sally Gardner Reed says, *"Nothing has doomed the relationship between Friends and the Library more than misunderstandings about how the money and the time of the Friends group will be spent."*

100 Years of WVLA Conferences!

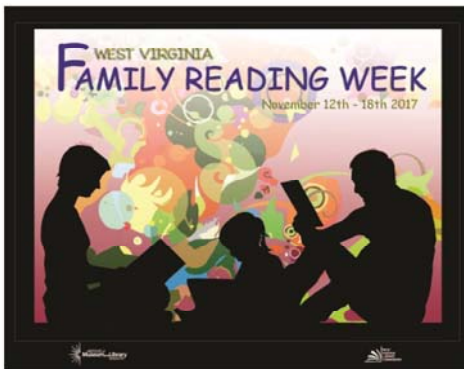
The WVLA gathers for its 100th conference this month in White Sulphur Springs. The annual event is scheduled for **November 8-10** at **The Greenbrier**.

A Well-Traveled Message



The Libraries Transform campaign's "Because" statements contain powerful messages about the value of libraries. One Michigan library found they have the potential to go viral.

The Caro Area District Library placed the statement, "Because not everything on the internet is true," in big black letters on its marquee that faces traffic as people pass or turn into the library. After a photo of the sign was posted on Facebook, its popularity quickly spread on social media, reaching more than 2.5 million people.

The post proved so contagious that George Takei of "Star Trek" fame re-posted the picture, calling it, "A good read."

25th Letters About Literature Contest is Underway!

For 25 years, the Library of Congress and the West Virginia Library Commission have sponsored the Letters About Literature contest. LAL is a national writing and reading competition for students in grades four through twelve.

Students choose a book, poem or speech that has had an impact on their view of the world, their personal lives, or both. Then they write a letter to the author, explaining why his or her work is important to them, and how it has affected them personally. Entries will be accepted beginning November 1, 2017, and must be postmarked by January 12, 2018.

State winners receive cash awards, are able to advance to the national competition, and are honored at a special

A Niche Academy trial invitation will be coming soon to your library. WVLC is assessing a new video tutorial collection geared especially for libraries. It's a learning platform that teaches the technical steps of using electronic resources in appealing videos. You embed the tutorials on your website where users are most likely to need them. That way, your patron does not leave your website.

As the resources your library offers evolve in applications and navigation, Niche Academy updates the tutorials. A wonderful feature allows libraries to create and upload their own tutorials for things such as Staff training. From how to use a handheld to how to navigate Kindle, training is covered by short videos. The simple, sequential instructions can be played as often as needed by the staff or patrons. 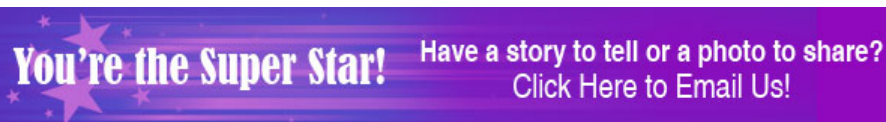


The Brooke County Public Library can trace its roots back to the late 19th century. The local Methodist Church established a library in Wellsburg in 1897, which served the community until a massive flood in 1936. Library service resumed three years later. Over the next three decades, the library was housed in a number of sites until moved to its present location in 1972. The Follansbee Branch opened in 1995. The system serves nearly 22,000 residents in Brooke County.
