

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# From the Secretary

August 2018



Each year on June 30, a trustee term expires in public libraries across the state. But that does not mean that the trustees whose terms expire quit serving. Chapter 10-1-5 c of the West Virginia Code states that trustees may serve until their successors are appointed. And many are reappointed. Last year, only 29 of the 97 public library systems in the state reported they had trustees serving their first terms. It is not unusual for trustees to serve 20, 25, 30, or more years. I sincerely thank every library trustee in the state for their service.

Trustees often tell me the position is more complex than they anticipated. They take the responsibility of being entrusted with the well being of an essential community service very seriously. The Library Commission's *West* 

<u>Virginia Public Library Trustee Manual</u> provides a general introduction to the duties, powers, and roles of library trustees. It provides a lot of information. But sometimes information needs supplemented with conversation.

For that reason, Library Development and Services Director Heather Shock-Campbell and I are scheduling regional Trustee Orientation sessions. Heather and I will cover topics such as roles and responsibilities, trustees as employers, financial responsibilities, and relevant state laws. The intent is to provide the scenic overlook version of these issues and, most importantly, to listen. To listen for better insight on the issues we know about and to listen for input on issues we don't know about.

It can be instructive sometimes to look at your world from 2,000 feet up.

As a library trustee, such is the case in reading *Our Towns: A 100,000-Mile Journey Into the Heart of America* by husband-and-wife authors James Fallows and Deborah Fallows. Their new national bestseller was recommended at our last trustees meeting by fellow board member Betty Barrett.

The authors spent from 2013-2016 flying their small airplane into a number of small cities and towns (including Charleston, WV) to take the economic and civic pulse of communities that are generally out of view of the national media. As they spent time and engaged with a variety of citizens in each community, they looked specifically at what makes for a successful city or town. Public libraries, it turns out, were determined to be "a surprisingly relevant bellwether institution."

"In the library, I could discover the spirit of a town, get a feel for the people's needs and wants, and gauge their energy and mettle."

Two examples shed particular light on the collaborative and symbiotic spirit that lends itself to strong libraries and successful towns: Columbus, Ohio—the largest city explored in the book—and the smaller town of Bend, Oregon. In the Columbus story, the authors point out how library trustees and Friends of the Library members

contribute in various ways, including leveraging their affiliations with other businesses and institutions in the city, to sustain "one of the town's stellar institutions." In Oregon, the librarians found a way to "embed" themselves in more than sixty community groups, changing the conversation over a few short years from "why are you here," to "how can we work with you?"

With nearly 170 mentions of 21st century American libraries, *Our Towns* offers a valuable perspective into how the library both reflects and serves each unique community.

### **WVLC Announces Grants to Public Libraries**

The West Virginia Library Commission has presented \$187,180 in state grants to 47 public libraries in the state. The grants were based on facility, programming, and collections proposals from each library. The maximum award was \$5,000 per library. 29 grants were awarded for facility maintenance, 9 for collection development, 9 for programming improvements, and 3 for other service enhancements.

The 2018 state grants represent a \$77,087 increase over the WVLC's 2017 awards.

### Kanawha County Public Library Raises More Pledges



Pledges totaling \$1.1 million have been made for the Kanawha County PL's upcoming expansion and renovation. The Greater Kanawha Valley Foundation is donating \$1 million to the library, and an anonymous donor is giving \$100,000.

Library marketing and development manager Terry Wooten says officials are trying to raise \$27 million for the

project, with about \$6 million still to go. She says construction should begin early next year and is expected to last 18 to 24 months.

### **Calhoun County Public Library Celebrates!**



The Calhoun County Public Library will celebrate its 50th anniversary on August 13.

The library was started in the 1930's by the Grantsville Senior Women's Club. After being housed in several locations during the 40's and 50's, it was established as a permanent library when it moved to its current location in 1968.

Over the years, the library has shown steady growth and now serves over 7,600 residents in Calhoun County.

### **Jackson County Public Library Lends a Helping Hand to Area Animals**



The Jackson County Public Library has announced a new program - Furry Friends for Fines. The library is now accepting donations of pet food, supplies, blankets, treats, etc.

Patrons with overdue fines can have their fines waived by donating any of these items. All donations will go to the Jackson County Animal Shelter.


### **Happy Retirement!**

# **New OCLC Report Examines How Public Libraries Communicate**



To learn more about how public libraries communicate, The national OCLC Online Computer Library Center conducted a survey among US public libraries that asked general questions about active engagement efforts with their communities. Questions covered marketing concerns and barriers, communication channels, how they use email marketing, and much more.

This report provides an overview of how US public libraries communicate to their users and the broader community. Results

confirm that libraries do a lot with limited resources, there's a focus on social media, and that efforts successfully increase community awareness about the library.

### FINDINGS INCLUDE:

- 96% use social media
- · 84% post photos, videos, or library information on social media
- 70% send email messages
- 40% have a communications strategy, but only 17% say it's current
- 71% say they don't have the necessary staff resources
- · 25% have marketing professionals on staff








# Featured Book of the Month!

### Victoria and Abdul

by Shrabai Basu

Tall and handsome
Abdul was just
twenty-four years old
when he arrived in
England from Agra
to wait at tables for



Queen Victoria's Golden Jubilee. Within a year, Abdul had grown to become a powerful figure at court, the Queen's teacher, or Munshi, her counsel on Urdu and Indian affairs, and a friend close to the Queen's heart. "I am so very fond of him.," Queen Victoria would write in 1888, "He is so good and gentle and understanding....a real comfort to me."

This marked the beginning of the most scandalous decade in Queen Victoria's long reign. Queen Victoria quickly found joy in an intense and controversial relationship with her Munshi, who traveled everywhere with her, cooked her



curries and cultivated her understanding of the Indian sub-continent--a region, as Empress of India, she was long intrigued by but could never visit.

Drawn from never-before-seen first-hand documents that had been closely guarded secrets for a century, Shrabani Basu's *Victoria & Abdul* is a remarkable history of the last years of the 19th century in English court, an unforgettable view onto the passions of an aging Queen, and a fascinating portrayal of how a young Indian Muslim came to play a central role at the heart of the British Empire.
